Sun. Feb 2 -7 Cloudy This year the Birtle firefighter's annual Vintage Snowmobile Derby will be held on Sunday February 23th at the Birtle Fire Hall. Registration is from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. The trail winds itself through the Birdtail Valley for a scenic ride of the Birdtail area.

We are hoping for a good turnout again, as this is a fun day and a chance to see the snowmobiles of yesterday. After the ride the snowmobiles are put on display. Everyone can and is encouraged to vote on the machine they like the best. The votes are counted and a trophy is awarded as the People's Choice for the most favourite snowmobile.

This derby is one of the fundraising events held annually by the firefighters. The funds raised are used to buy specialised equipment for our fire department. Our most recent project was the completion of our forced air drying rack for our turnout gear, purchase of a utility shed, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch impact wrench, 3 air bottles and 2 support struts for stabilizing vehicles or structures.

The equipment purchased this year totaled \$11,966.78 dollars. This was all purchased with money that was donated to our equipment fund as well as raised by the department members through events like the Vintage Snowmobile Derby and our annual Pancake Breakfast.

The members of the fire department will once again be out looking for your support of this derby, through the sale of silent rider tickets which makes you eligible to win a cash prize



and prizes for our raffle table. A raffle table is set up with prizes that are donated by local and surrounding area businesses and also by individuals who donated prizes. Draw tickets are sold on the raffle prizes at the derby.

Last year's pay out was 1^{st} for riders and silent riders \$755.00 each, 2^{nd} place for each \$453.00 and 3^{rd} place for each was \$302.00.

If you have a Vintage Snowmobile of 25 years or older bring it down and come for the ride with us, or if you like just come down in the afternoon and join us for a coffee and see the old snowmobiles as they come back from the trail and are on display. This always brings back memories and stories of our early snowmobiling days.

Mindful Moments: Body Scan

A body scan is a technique where you bring awareness to different parts of your body. You can practice it for a few minutes while sitting or lying down:

- 1.Start by bringing your attention to your feet. Notice any sensations, such as tension, heaviness or warmth.
- 2. Slowly move your attention up your body - your calves, knees, thighs, and so on paying attention to how each area feels as you go.
- 3. Notice any areas of tension or relaxation. But don't judge. Just notice.
- 4. If your mind wanders, gently bring it back to the body part you were focusing on and continue until you have "tuned in" to your whole body.

This practice can help release tension and promote relaxation while strengthening your mindbody connection.





THE VALUE SHOPPE

STORIES OF DAYS GONE BY Written By Laurie Harvey Parobec

Another Foxwarren hockey/rink story as told by my dad, George Simms.....

The first organized hockey in Manitoba was a Junior A league in Winnipeg. Then a decision was made for a Junior B league for rural Manitoba. Up until that time there was just home & away games, where you would play at a neighbouring town and then that town would come to Foxwarren to play. There were no leagues. In 1944, in the Junior B league, Foxwarren lost to Shoal Lake in the finals. In 1945 Foxwarren defeated Teulon in the final to win the Baldy Northcott Trophy. The game was played in Winnipeg. With 4 minutes left in the game the score was 4-2 for Teulon but Foxwarren won in overtime with a score of 5-4. That was the first time that the Foxwarren team had played on artificial ice. In 1946 Foxwarren lost to Teulon in the final round. Glenn Breakey (brother of Evelyn Simms) played on the team that year. In 1948, the year Clarence (George's brother) was in Grade 12, Andy Low thought there was still enough good players to enter a team in the league. Clarence was going to school in Russell then and he told Andy the names of some guys he should get from Russell and Andy trusted him. Clarence played on the team and there were 3 players from Russell, two from Binscarth and someone from Rossburn. In the wintertime the road from Rossburn to Russell was quite often blocked so Carmen Ryan would take his plane and pick up the guy from Rossburn for the games. In the playoffs, they were to play two games and team with the most goals would win, but it ended up in a tie. The referee didn't know what to do when it was tied so he made a call to



someone and it was decided that they would play a third game. It was supposed to be on neutral ice but Melvin Graham negotiated that they would play in Shoal Lake and Foxwarren would get two thirds of the gate. Foxwarren won the game. Then they went on to play Neepawa. That was a long way to travel so someone got the idea that they should rent a train. The local CPR station agent was asked and his reply was "Rent a train? Whoever heard of renting a train?" Melvin Graham contacted someone he knew and managed to arrange to rent a train to pick them up. The train started in Inglis and picked up players and fans along the way. Mom and dad and I went. Delmar Bamford was there too. They won against Neepawa and the train brought them all back. They played another team after that. I can't remember the name of the town but they ended up winning the championship and the Baldy Northcott Trophy. It was after that year that they began having organized leagues for minor hockey.

I found this photo of the Foxwarren team in 1948.....the team that took the train to Neepawa to play and won the championship. Please let me know if we have any of the names wrong or if you know the 2 players whose names we don't have.
