

Birtle & area welcome the talented Aleksandra as she opens her new studio. Here is an introduction from her and a peak at some of her amazing work!

"Each of us dreams of finding our own style one that will reflect our individuality and harmonizes with modern trends."

Here I am, a master of my craft. I sew and cut clothes of any complexity. I embody the most daring ideas in the repair and alteration of things. In addition, I offer unique paintings to order, make handmade toys and do hand embroidery. My atelier is not just about fashion. It's about individuality, creativity and has soul invested in every detail.

Let's get to know each other! My name is Aleksandra. Ten months ago I came to Canada with my husband from Ukraine. I have been living in Birtle for nine months. In Ukraine, I had my own fashion atelier and many customers. I have been working in this business for more than 25 years.

I really love my work. For more than 15 years I have been painting to order. These are paintings of the names of people who want to see inspiring symbolism in the painting, so that there is something special in it that gives strength, meaning in life. This is not just a person's name, it is a coat of arms, history, strength, a mystery about a person. I

communicate very carefully with the customer so that the painting is rich and strong. Unfortunately, I was only able to take a small number of copies with me. But they are wonderful and you can see them in my studio. In Ukraine I had my own exhibition of my works. But the war in Ukraine radically changed my plans.

Since March 1, 2022, I have been a volunteer. I helped the defenders of Ukraine - I delivered things, food to soldiers. I conducted master classes for children who were left

without homes. There were like-minded people with me, we supported each other. My husband went to fight as a volunteer. My husband has been a volunteer since 2014. But during the performance of a combat mission he was seriously wounded. After being wounded, he was discharged from military service. We made a difficult decision to leave Ukraine. We thank Canada for opening visas for us. We have a daughter who is 23 years old. She still remains in Ukraine in the city of Kyiv. We hope that she will soon be safe.

My English language started a year ago. I never studied English, neither at school nor in the institute. It is an amazing and interesting language. I get pleasure from studying it. Now I can speak in three languages: Ukrainian, Russian and English.

Thank you for the great support to Eleanor Dnistransky, Zoey Jebb and all the residents of Birtle. We feel almost at home!

I invite you to an open day in my little fashion studio. Which will take place at 12pm on



JUDIE BEWER Receives the Healthy and Active Living Ambassador Award

The Healthy and Active Living Award award recognizes Manitoba individuals age 65 and older who actively contribute to helping older adults stay physically active in their communities. The award winner's efforts have a significant impact on the health and well-being of older adults through promoting physical activity and fitness.

After the construction of Old Grace Housing Co-op in 2018, Judi Bewer, a resident there, organized a group that shares fitness activities to residents of all abilities and background who might be interested in physical activity. Her classes are held three times per week and consist of a blend of dance, stretching, weights, yoga, and Pilates. The co-op is a diverse community, consisting of residents who are young, old, able-bodied, differentlyabled, newcomers, and born Canadians. Judi's activities are inviting and inclusive including a recently-arrived Ukrainian grandmother and some participants who Judi has adapted her workouts to accommodate mobility challenges. In addition to the activities described above, she also attends aquacize classes with some of the same women who attend her exercise classes. Judi and her husband were organic flax farmers for 40 years near Birtle, Manitoba. While in Birtle, Judi spearheaded the development of an exercise facility, which gave her the experience she needed to participate in the creation of an exercise room at the new housing co-op once they retired and moved to Winnipeg. She comes prepared to classes with her iPad and Bluetooth speaker, having researched a musical theme for the week and created a playlist on Spotify. Judi is a natural leader. Her experience in physical education and her ability to lead by example is impressive and inspiring. It's also reflected in the joy of movement experienced by participants in her classes.







STORIES OF DAYS GONE BY

The damage to the Foxwarren Rink from the storm last summer had many present and former residents of Foxwarren reflecting on the times each of us have spent in that rink over the years. Whether it was for hockey, a dance, a funeral or a reunion it has been a gathering place on so many occasions. If my dad, George Simms, was still alive he would be devastated to see it. This is a rink story written in dad's own words that I have saved along with many other stories he has told. I'm sure he would have been retelling it to us after the storm if he were here.

The rink was built in 1949 and in 1973 we added onto the north end to make a larger ice surface and we put in artificial ice. When the artificial ice was put in they had to dig down under the rink quite a few feet and put in new fill as that spot was kind of like a swamp. I was president of the rink board at that time. They put in three different layers of cement. The guy in charge of the cement came out to the farm one day to talk to me. The weather was really hot and the guy said there wasn't enough ventilation. So we had to do something or it would be a disaster. We came up with the idea to open up a couple of spots up in the corner of the wall,



and we opened all the doors including the big door on the north end, but it wasn't enough. So I got the idea to go and talk to Merv Gadd. He had a snow plane. It had skis on it and a big propeller. He hadn't used it for years but he went to the shed and spun the propeller and it started. So about six guys loaded it onto a big four ton truck and we brought it into town and set it by the big doors at the north end. He started it and the propeller blew the air enough to keep it cool so the cement would dry and set properly.


