# **LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENTS LOOK FOR YOUR HELP!**

This is a long read, but it explains why our Medical First Response services in MB are in jeopardy and what we're doing to try and save it. We encourage you to share this article and to speak out & voice your concerns by contacting your MLA and local government. After all, it's the public's safety and emergency medical care that's at stake

#### HOW DID WE GET TO WHERE WE ARE

- The College of Paramedics of Manitoba (CPMB) decided to make changes to the Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) course which now sees the required training hours go from 120 to 312. These changes were made and approved by the College without any feasibility study or consultation with Medical First Response (MFR) agencies or the Municipalities that fully fund these MFR agencies.

- Once hearing of this news, MFR representatives tried to reason with the College and to get them to understand what the negative impact these changes would make in regards to sustaining our services, but it all fell over deaf ears and they went ahead and continued on their path without considering any of our concerns.

Many resolutions from Municipalities that were apposed of these changes were sent to Provincial Ministers. Association of MB Municipalities (AMM) also passed a resolution to lobby the MB Government against these changes. Completed petitions were sent to AMM. The media also published stories of what was transpiring and how it would effect MFR services.

Deputy Health Minister, Karen Herd, set up a working group comprised of Shared Health, MB Health, AMM, Office of the Fire Commissioner (OFC), Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs (MAFC),



CPMB, and MFR reps. to try and come up with a satisfactory and reasonable solution that would meet everyone's needs.

- Shared Health came up with a proposal that did not include any involvement by MFR representatives. This proposal outlined three choices for Municipalities to adopt.

1.Remain as Medical First Response 2. Provide a Fire First Response service 3. Provide no service at all.

- The MFR group was not satisfied with the proposal for the following main reasons: 1.Remaining as a MFR agency would not be sus-

tainable for most in the province because the new training requirements for EMRs makes it close to impossible to recruit new students. MFRs are volunteer based so the EMRs that make up this service have other full time jobs and/or are raising families and cannot commit to the almost tripling of hours required to be trained as an EMR.

2. Fire First Response would not work without the affiliation and dispatching of MTCC.

The skills that have been outlined with this service

is not sufficient. We need to be able to continue performing delegated acts or skills such as ASA, Acetaminophen, Salbutamol, Nitroglycerin, Glucometry, Oximetry & a full set of Vitals including blood pressure.

- Shared Health has decided to hold a one-day Municipal Medical First Response planning workshop on April 25. Their objectives are to inform Municipal Governments by providing in-person forums, clarify legislative and regulatory requirements, provide information on first-aid and medical first response training options. They will not be presenting any other proposals or inviting any more ideas at this event.

#### THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- The 2012 Emergency Medical Services review found many areas of concern with all levels of service, including MFR. Go to the following link to view the entire report. <a href="https://www.gov.mb.ca/health/">https://www.gov.mb.ca/health/</a> documents/ems.pdf
- EMS (ambulance) services continue to get worse in rural MB in regards to response times which makes MFR services even more important then ever before.
- The new EMR training requirements implemented by the College of Paramedics will force MFRs to discontinue their services and either adopt a lower level of service or not provide the service at all.
- The current proposed Fire First Response service would not allow us to carry or administer Aspirin, Tylenol, Salbutamol (inhalers) and Nitroglycerine. Meanwhile, any member of the public can get these over the counter, excluding Salbutamol. We would also not be able to check a patient's blood sugar level or blood oxygen level. These are simple procedures that trained personnel can perform and when they are done early enough, can drastically change a patient's outcome . It makes no sense to take these away from First Responders and we have not gotten an explanation as to why this has been done.
- The public in which MFR agencies are present sees our services as crucial in rural MB and support our cause.
- All MFR agencies are funded by local taxpayers through the municipal tax base. There is no cost to the province.
- Municipalities can't afford to pay yearly fees of \$695 per EMR or to train new EMRs at a cost of over \$10,000 per EMR.
- Those few that are looking at becoming an EMR, cannot get enrolled with any of the educators because there is not enough enrollment so the courses keep getting canceled. This means, even if wanted to become a volunteer or full time EMR, you can't get trained.
- When dispatched alongside EMS, MFRs play a important roll in pre-hospital care by closing that gap in the response and providing professional medical care within our jurisdic-

tions. We can be with a patient up to 30 minutes prior to EMS arriv-

- MFRs take pride in the service they can provide to their local residents and those that visit our communities. They are knowledgeable of the area and know what is expected from the public. They are also committed to helping others by dedicating volunteer time and sacrificing time away from their families.
- MFRs didn't ask for change. Everything was working well the way it was. We have now been forced to fight for our survival and to be able to provide a high level of emergency medical care in our com-
- We will not back down until we are satisfied with the level of service we can provide.
- We have the support of the public, Municipalities, AMM, EMS, MLAs and other organizations. Besides the College of Paramedics, there is no one that we know of, that is in support of what the College has done.

#### WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE

- -Our current MFR group is willing to adopt a Fire First Response based system that was proposed by Shared Health in Nov, 2022. Saying that, the model of the proposed Fire First Response has to change. We are asking for two very important aspects to be added to make this an efficient and acceptable level of service.
- 1. Continue to be dispatched by MTCC for these reasons: A-To limit any delays in being paged out (within 45 seconds of EMS being paged)

B-Having direct communication with MTCC dispatchers who are EMRs to relay critical information back and forth.

C-Having the ability for MTCC dispatchers to get us and the incoming EMS personnel to communicate via radio to be able to rely updated patient reports, location details, additional resources required,

D-If we are not affiliated with MTCC, there is no way for them to know which Fire Departments provide Fire First Response services. They would have no way of knowing when to have a Fire Dept. paged out.

- 2. Allow additional skills to the service, even if it requires changes in legislation and regulations. These skills include carrying and administering ASA, Acetaminophen, Salbutamol & Nitroglycerine. Also, to be able to check a patient's blood sugar level, blood oxygen level and full set of vitals, including blood pressure.
- We need to sit down with the personal who have the ability to make these changes and can explain, in their opinion, why this can or cannot be done.

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

This is a little tardy, however I was waiting for the right segway to write about the recent passing of Foxwarren's Lloyd Tibbatts.—Sir Lloyd Clifford Tibbats Feb 22 1924 March 1 2023

Sympathy and nationwide gratitude is sent to Lloyd and his family. "Lloyd Tibbatts, a veteran of the Second World War who fought with the Regina Rifles and the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, and who was part of the invasion force on D-Day, was honored with the government of France's highest honor recently. French Consul Bruno Burnichon travelled to Russell,

Manitoba where Tibbatts, 97, now lives, to present the French Legion of Honor—the highest honor the government of France can give. Lloyd Tibbatts, served with the Canadian army during the Second World War from April 13, 1943 to March 30, 1946.He enlisted and served with the Winnipeg Rifles and then transferred to the Regina Rifles with the Canadian Infantry while in France in July of 1944. Lloyd participated in Operation Overlord, landing at 7:45 am on the sixth of June, 1944. He served in the liberation of France, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Germany, and was nominated for the French National Order of the Legion of Honour for his involvement in the

Normandy, France on June 6, 1944. Following his honourable discharge from the Canadian Infantry in 1946, Lloyd returned to his home at Foxwarren, Manitoba. Tibbatts has been a member of the Royal Canadian Legion for 71 years, having joined in 1950. During his 71 years of service



to the Royal Canadian Legion he served at the Foxwarren branch and then he transferred to Russell when he moved to Russell." Kevin Weedmark, The World-Spectator.

It is a wonderful story that culminates in a thousand kilometre bike ride to raise awareness and funds for "Wounded Warriors Canada". It is a tremendous organization that helps our military people and also our front line people in civilian life. Police people, EMT people, all of our people who are on the front lines of civilian protection. They are all important to us and they need our support. All the information you need is readily available online for you to find and I feel very strongly that this is a wonderful story that I feel the need to be a part of somehow, so please, stay tuned.

Our Canadian girls fell short of a medal at the recent World Curling in Sweden. 

## From the desk of Linda Clark

Terry and Jana Joseph have just returned from a winter getaway to Utah. Jana shares this about their trip. "For all you out there who like to get away in the winter to warmer destinations(but not too warm), and who



are looking to do some beautiful walks/hikes (and possibly some pickleball, cycling or golf), I highly recommend you check out St. George, Utah. Several people asked us before we left on vacation in January, "Why St. George"? Wasn't sure how to answer that question, as I myself was not convinced we would find enough to do there for an entire month, but hae to say we were not disappointed. We chose to drive to St. George rather than fly, and it's about a 22 hour drive from Miniota. If you prefer to fly, your best bet would be to fly into Las Vegas and get a rental car from there, as St. George is located about 2 hours northeast of Vegas.

St. George is a city of approximately 100,000 people. It is in the perfect location, at a bit lower elevation than some of the surrounding countryside so it tends to get slightly warmer temperatures during the colder months, and is nestled in among some stunning red rock cliffs. We stayed from mid January to mid February at the Estancia Resort and shared a condo with my girlfriend (Helen Tack) and her husband Greg. We were extremely happy with our spacious condo and made good use of the outdoor pickleball courts and hot tub. So many incredible hikes right in the St. George area, and for those of you who like to shop, this city has it all, even a Costco!

Snow Canyon is a 7400 acre state park located 10 minutes north of St. George. It is tucked amid lava flows and soaring sandstone cliffs in a strikingly colorful desert environment. We went there several times during our stay to hike on some of their beautiful trails. This park has more than 38 miles of hiking trails and a 3 mile paved walking/biking trail. There is an entrance fee but it is very reasonably priced at \$15.00 per vehicle. Pack a lunch and spend a day!

Pioneer Park is much smaller (52 acres) and is located right in St. George. It is definitely worth spending a couple of hours here as well to walk among the unique rock formations and take in the panoramic view of the city from the top of Dixie Rock. If you are a lover of plants, a quick walk around the "Red Hills Desert Garden" (in this same location) is worth doing. Nothing in bloom during the time of year we were there, but still some pretty interesting plants, especially some of the cactus.

Another attraction just 15 minutes from St. George (located in Ivins) is the Tuacahn Outdoor Amphitheatre. Although we didn't have the opportunity to take in any of their shows or concerts, we did make it to the Saturday outdoor market. We also walked a portion of the "Padre Canyon Trail" which is accessible from the theatre's parking lot, and we did a bit of shopping at their interesting little gift shop. We discovered so many impressive hikes around the St. George area, and being there for a full month gave us a chance to explore even more of this incredible rocky and colorful countryside. Following is a

list of some of the other great hikes we did that were within an hours drive of St. George: Babylon Arch, The Bowl/aka The Vortex, Diamond Cinder Cone Owen's Loop, Elephant Arch, Hellhole Canyon Trail, Red Reef Trail, Chuckwalla Trail (with Turtle Wall & paradise Rim), Scout Cave and Yant Flats.

Following our stay in St. George, we headed to Bryce Canyon and then on to Zion National Park where we spent a few nights in the small village of Springdale. You could easily do a day trip to Zion from St. George as it is only a one hour drive, but we wanted to stay right in the park. Terry and I had been there several years ago and knew we would want more than just one day to explore this stunning park with all its spectacular views at every turn and on every trail. They don't run the shuttles in Zion during the winter months so you do need a vehicle to get around. I would suggest visiting this park during the week if at all possible when it is less busy (definitely not on a long weekend). If you ever make it out to this area of Utah, both Bryce Canyon and Zion National Park are "must sees" in my book. Visiting these popular parks during off season is so nice as they aren't nearly as busy. Take a pair of ice cleats to strap onto your shoes and you will be all set! We manage to get to some of the magnificent viewpoints overlooking Bryce Canyon, but without ice cleats, you couldn't walk down into the hoodoos as it was too icy.

To end off our holiday we spent a week in Moab, Utah. We were extremely fortunate to get a good travel day when leaving Springdale, which enabled us to take "Scenic Byway 12" up to Moab. This added on a couple of hours of travel time but was so worth it. Spanning a route of more than 120 miles, Utah's 'Scenic Byway 12" travels through some of the most diverse and ruggedly beautiful landscapes. Rated among the top ten scenic byways in America, this paved highway winds through slickrock canyons, red rock cliffs, pin and aspen forest, alpine mountains, quaint rural towns and some national and state parks. We had originally planned to spend a couple of nights in Torrey to do some of the hikes at Capitol Reef National Park, what with snow in the upcoming forecast, we figured we'd better head directly through to Moab. If the opportunity ever arises, I would love to go back some day and spend a full week checking out some of the small towns and abundance of hiking trails along this scenic byway. So glad we at least got the chance to do the drive this time around.

We did not have the best weather during our final week in Moab, but really only had one day when we couldn't get out and do some hikes. Moab is a larger town with a population of just over 5,000. We enjoyed doing some shopping in their quaint little shops and even found some indoor courts where we were able to join in with the locals and play some pickleball. "Arches National Park" was close by and was absolutely spectacular. We did several of the hikes there, including the trail to Utah's most famous arch, "Delicate Arch". We drove out to Canyonlands and did a few of the hikes and overlooks in the "Island In the Sky" district. Canyonlands is divided into 3 districts and it takes hours to travel from one district to another, so most people focus on one area per visit. "Island In the Sky" is the most accessible and is the closes to Moab (about a 40 minute drive). It has a paved scenic drive with stunning views of the surrounding buttes and water-carved canvons. We also discovered a fabulous hike about 15 miles from Moab that

takes in two amazing arches (Corona Arch and Bowtie Arch). For any of you who love quading, I think Moab would be a great place for you to visit, especially when the weather gets a bit warmer. From the looks of all the ATV rental shops, I'm thinking that would be the perfect way to see the more remote districts in Canyonlands and around Moab. Our drive home was also very scenic from Moab to Vail, but wouldn't want to be on that busy stretch of the interstate during adverse weather

Hope this helps some of you travelers out there who are looking for a new place to vacation during the winter months. Definitely not a "hot beach" kind of holiday, but perfect for those of you who like to do some outdoor activities in more moderate temperatures. Terry came home with tan lines from his sandals once again and did appear to be wearing shorts in the majority of our St. George photos, so that is proof the winter weather out that way was not too bad at all. # MANITOBA GOVERNMENT TO INCREASE MINIMUM WAGE TWICE IN 2023

# Second Increase at Beginning of October to Raise Rate to \$15.30: Reyes

This October, Manitoba minimum wage earners will be making \$3.35 per hour more than they were in September 2022 following iterative increases that position Manitoba as one of the top minimum wage provinces in Canada, Labour and Immigration Minister Jon Reyes announced today.

"Recognizing the exceptional financial challenges facing Manitobans,

our government passed legislative amendments to the Employment Standards Code that, in prescribed circumstances, allow minimum wage to be increased by an additional amount above the legislated inflation-tied formula," said Reyes. "To balance the financial realities of Manitoba workers and the economic challenges for small businesses, we implemented a phased-in approach that will help more Manitobans get ahead."

The increases started with a \$1.55 increase to \$13.50 on Oct. 1, 2022, to be followed by a 65 cent increase to \$14.15 on April 1 and now a further \$1.15 annual increase on Oct. 1 to \$15.30. These increases project Manitoba to be top three in provincial minimum wages.

The minister noted the legislated inflation-tied formula ensures minimum wage is tied to economic indicators to maintain purchasing power, stability and predictability for businesses.

Following the Oct. 1, 2022, minimum wage increase, the Manitoba government implemented the Small Business Minimum Wage Adjustment Program to support small businesses. The program's eligibility has recently expanded to include seasonal (summer) employees, and the application and submission process has been streamlined to allow eligible small businesses to make a single online application to receive a one-time lump sum payment. The program is available until March 31, noted Reyes.
