

By the time you read this, the historic heritage building at 378 Main Street, that houses the museum's artifacts will have a NEW ROOF. Good-bye dripping ceilings, damp walls and damaged articles. Hello safe, secure and protected second floor treasures.

In another leap forward, those previously crumbling and damp, cracking upstairs walls will be rebuilt. A new wall with insulation will buffer the exterior stone walls on the west and north side of the second floor. The museum will be investing its savings in this signif-





icant interior fix and as a result the second floor will be open to visitors this summer. Fundraising ventures will be getting off the ground very soon and we are grateful for any and all support.

The Canadian Cattle Association completed its 2025 Annual General Meeting on Thursday, March 20, 2025 in Ottawa with a number of events, meetings and election of a new Board of Directors.

Tyler Fulton of Birtle, Manitoba moves into the president position taking over from Nathan Phinney of Sackville, New Brunswick who remains on the Board in the past president position. Sheila Hillmer and Doug Roxborough of Alberta and Jack Chaffe of Ontario retired from the Board. Past President Bob Lowe is also retired from the Board. CCA thanks them for their time and contributions.

Many issues were addressed in meetings as a rapidly changing environment faces Canadian cattle producers and all of Canadian agriculture. The Ottawa meeting location allowed many guests to join, including beef producers from nearby provinces and across the country. The Honourable Kody Blois brought greetings and well wishes at the retirement dinner on Wednesday evening in honour of past president Nathan Phinney. Phinney retired from the president position Wednesday evening after 27 months.

Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada representatives presented at committee meetings and CCA was pleased to learn about steps being taken to reduce regulatory burdens that will support the Canadian beef sector and grow our global competitiveness—an announcement that was made on March 19, 2025.

Canadian Food Inspection Agency representatives and Canadian Cattle Identification Agency General Manager Ashley Scott presented at the Animal Health and Care Committee; Kent Bacus, National Cattlemen's Beef Association presented at the Domestic Agriculture, Food Policy and Foreign Trade Committee Meetings; and Tyler McCann of the Canadian Agriculture Policy Institute presented at the Domestic Agriculture Committee meeting.

The Livestock Markets Association of Canada has been welcomed as an associated organization member of the Canadian Cattle Association.



Obituary



Holly Maureen (Brown) Titterton passed away on March 18th, 2025 in the Shoal Lake Health Center.

Holly was predeceased by her father James (Jim) Brown, her mother Donna Brown, sister Loree Howe and sister-in-law Carol (Lee) Brown. She is survived by her husband Dwight Titterton, brother Scott (Jeanette), sister Shauna Sauk, and brother Dean, along with numerous nieces and nephews.

A celebration of life will be held at 2pm on May 17 at the Birtle Drop In.

Holly was born in Hamiota on January 19, 1958 and lived on a farm near Kenton. The family then moved to Basswood, Elphinstone and eventually Birtle as Jim was an agent for Pool elevators.

After highschool Holly worked as a nurses aide

caring for polio patients at a government hospital in Winnipeg. During this time she started dating her future husband Dwight, a young farmer from Solsgirth. Dwight and Holly were wed on June 16, 1979 and took up residence at the Titterton farm. Although not very familiar with the farm life, Holly quickly adapted and soon she was milking cows, cleaning the barn and bailing hay and always ready for a new task.

In later life Holly dealt with a number of health problems including migraines, chronic abdominal pains and diabetes. In 2014 she fell and broke her ankle and when it failed to heal properly due to her diabetes, her right leg had to be amputated. In spite of these difficulties Holly remained cheerful and positive and everyone who knew her could attest the her sweet disposition. Hollly also suffered through three bouts of cancer and this is what finally ended her life.


