Answering the Call: Local Volunteers Help Fight Wildfires

As wildfires continue partments from across the province have mobilized in response to the growing need. Among them are dedicated individuals from Birtle, Miniota, and multiple nearby communities.

Seven members from West Central Mutual Aid deployed to Eastern Man-


itoba on May 30th, where they joined value protection efforts. Working in difficult terrain and long hours, they became part of a team effort tackling the fires in that region.

As the situation escalated in northern Manitoba, further help was requested near Flin Flon. After returning home, one Birtle firefighter volunteered once again — this time joining Hamiota's crew to support efforts on the front lines of one of the province's largest wildfires.

By Thursday, three more Birtle firefighters brought additional support and a pumper truck to the Flin Flon region.

This work is part of a much larger, province-wide mutual aid response involving fire departments from across the province. Together, departments are working side-by-side to safeguard homes and communities.



Holistic Highlights with Zoey Jebb

Collective Healing and The Power of Witnessing

In a world that often teaches us to push through pain or carry it alone in silence, there is profound medicine in being seen. One of the most powerful things we can offer each other is presence - a quiet witness to someone else's experience.

I've personally known deep loss on many occasions. And when I look back on each of those moments, the thing I remember most is who showed up. The ones who

stood quietly beside me and gave me complete permission to be vulnerable. As though they expected nothing else. Their presence was and anchor. The quiet kind of love that asked nothing of me.

Last week, while out extinguishing hot spots up north, a man who had just lost his home and most of his community, came and began sharing his story with us. We stopped what we were doing. We listened. We gave him space to speak his experience out loud. And in that moment we weren't just firefighters, we were witnesses. That moment reminded me: sometimes presence is the most powerful response.

Through the years, I've been in many spaces where grief, fear and exhaustion hung heavy in the air. And although I am a problem solver at heart, I've learned that the most healing moments don't always come from fixing things. They come from simply standing beside someone. Open-hearted, steady and just being there.

There is alchemy in that kind of presence.

When we allow ourselves to truly witness another without judgment or rushing to rescue, we create a space where healing can take root. Where it's OK to accept the awfulness of it all and to feel it in it's wholeness. And when we ourselves are witnessed, something inside begins to soften. The nervous system settles. The burden lightens. Our story shifts.

In some Indigenous and community heal-

ing practices, pain is not meant to be endured alone. It is shared and felt together, processed together and sometimes even surrendered together.

That's the kind of strength that we can learn together.


Loss isn't something new nor is it something that will ever end. It is a part of life. And so is the healing.

With consideration of the recent events that have impacted both our local community as well as those around us, this is a gentle reminder of the importance of patience. A reminder to slow down. To give each other space to speak, grieve or sit in silence. To be kind with our words, generous with our presence and to be willing to carry even a little of what others can no longer hold alone.

Healing takes time. And some burdens feel too heavy to carry alone.

But when community comes together we don't just share the weight - we have the ability to transform it.


