#### Adam Shoalts, Arctic Explorer and Bestselling Author, Visits Birtle submitted

Museum members Lorraine Snow, Brenda Evans and Margaret Ashcroft spent a very interesting afternoon with Canadian Geographic Explorer in Residence, best-selling author and sought after public speaker, Adam Shoalts. when he paid a visit to Birtle last October as part of his research for his upcoming book on arctic explorer, Hubert Darrell.

Hubert Darrell homesteaded in the Birtle area in 1890 along with his brother, Charles.

However, it wasn't long before Hubert was enticed by the Klondike gold rush to seek his fortune with the intent to pay off the farm. He ended up spending the rest of his life in the north for the love of the region and the adventures it offered and took up exploring the far reaches of the arctic from 1899 until 1910 when he mysteriously disappeared

east of Tuktoyaktuk, N.W.T. He also acted as a guide and friend to several well-known arctic explorers and, for a period of time, he was a mail carrier for Hudson Bay posts and also a guide for the North West Mounted Police patrols in the Yukon.

Adam considers Hubert Darrell, "one of the greatest in North American exploration history — who rarely used canoes and almost always travelled on foot, and often in the winter. No one has ever written a book about him and he doesn't even have a Wikipedia page, but when he's mentioned in the journals of celebrity explorers like Hanbury, Tyrrell and Stefansson, he sounds practically superhuman. He vanished without a trace in 1910, at the age of 35, somewhere near the Anderson River in the Western Arctic. There were later reports, carried back to Hudson's Bay

Company posts, of strange carvings in trees, and it was speculated that he might have left them as messages."

Adam's passion for the past decade has been learning all he could about Hubert Darrell which included retracing his forgotten routes with the intent of finally giving Darrell the recognition he deserves. Adam says his soon to be released book; Vanished Beyond the Map, The Mystery of Lost Explorer, Hubert Darrell "represents the culmination of more than a decade of research in the wilderness, searching out old ruins, and forgotten campsites, and endless hours spent squinting at faded letters and water-stained journals, all to bring to light the story of legendary lost explorer Hubert Darrell."

Margaret Ashcroft was

able to show Adam exactly where the Darrell's lived since they homesteaded adjacent to her family's land, southeast of Birtle in what was then known as the Warleigh district. Adam was excited to learn that Margaret was able to fill in some missing details about the Darrell family since she remembered Hubert's brother, Charles, when she was a young girl.

Adam also had a tour of the museum and was very interested to see old photographs of the town during the time period Hubert lived in the area. Museum members were able to provide some information about Agnes Dudley, to whom Hubert had become engaged and also about her father, banker, Joseph Dudley.

The pleasant afternoon was also spent driving around the countryside, showing Adam some of the beautiful scenic spots in and around Birtle so he could get a sense of the place Hubert Darrell called home. One of the unexpected highlights for Adam was seeing a prairie garter snake - a first for him. He enthusiastically jumped out of the car with his camera to take a picture. Adam explained that one of his projects is the Great Canadian Snake Quest, a multi-year expedition project to find, document, and photograph all of Canada's native snake species in the wild. The goal is to raise awareness about the threats they face and provide educational resources to classrooms across the country.

Plans are in the works to develop a display dedicated to Hubert Darrell in the museum in the upcoming months where you can learn more about this man's extraordinary life and accomplishments.

Vanished Beyond the Map, The Mystery of Lost Explorer, Hubert Darrell will be released on October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2025 and is available for preorder at most bookstores. There may be a possibility that Adam Shoalts will include Birtle on his book tour across Canada. Stay tuned!

Declared one of the "greatest living explorers" by Canadian Geographic, and named "Canada's Indiana Jones" by the Toronto Star, Adam Shoalts is a professional adventurer and the author of five national bestselling books. His career has included mapping rivers, leading expeditions for the Royal Canadian Geographical Society and Mountain Equipment Co-op, archaeological digs, tracking endangered species, and completing a nearly 4,000 km solo journey across Canada's Arctic. On his expeditions he sometimes goes months without seeing another person. In 2022, he canoed and hiked from southern Canada to the Arctic.

Shoalts has written about edible mushrooms, deforestation, and watershed pollution in northern Canada. His writing career began with his "Reflections of a Naturalist" column on wild animals and conservation, which later led to his #1 national bestsellers Alone Against the North and Be-

yond the Trees, the award-winning story of his adventures. Shoalts's work has been featured in media around the world, including the BBC, CNN, CTV, CBC, Reader's Digest, the Washington Post, The Guardian and many others.

A History of Canada in 10 Maps is currently the #1 bestselling nonfiction book in Canada as of June 17, 2025 declared by the Toronto Star.

Topic: Executive Summary of the June 12<sup>th</sup> Regular Board Meeting

\_\_\_\_\_

- Waywayseecappo School is planning for an expanded <u>Outdoor Education program</u> starting in September. It will include a full-time teacher dedicated to providing landbased learning for students.
- 2. There are two initiatives planned for 2025-2026 to foster student empowerment by increasing meaningful student participation in school and divisional decision-making processes. The first involves the establishment of a Divisional Student Advisory Committee to ensure students have a formal, influential platform to share perspectives. The second will be a collaboration involving student councils.
- 3. The Middle Years track meet was held in Shoal Lake on June 10.
- 4. The Division received \$323,000 in provincial and federal funding for the Universally Accessible School Nutrition Program. Money was allocated directly to schools.
- 5. An advisory group made up of teachers, principals, and staff from across the division has developed a new K-8 Literacy Framework aligned with provincial directives to enhance student learning.
- 6. Teacher staffing for the 2025-2026 school year is near completion with only a few positions that remain vacant.
- 7. The secretary-treasurer reported on recent activities which included the completion of annual financial reporting to the province, an examination of the Five-Year Capital Plan, and an update on ventilation funding.
- 8. The Board approved fuel tenders for 2025-2026 with community co-ops being selected as our suppliers.
- 9. Trustees debriefed on two very successful recent events, the staff recognition night and the biannual meeting with Waywayseecappo.
- 10. Several divisional schools received recognition for Terry Fox fundraising. They included Major Pratt School, Inglis School, Shoal Lake School, and Strathclair Community School.
- 11. The next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for August 28.

and Robert Cross all of Saltcoats, SK came to celebrate Walter's birthday. Happy Birthday Walter!



#### **Parent's Guide to Co-Regulation**

Simple ways to be your child's calm when emotions run high

When your child is overwhelmed, melting down, or shutting down, it can be hard to know what to do. You might feel helpless or frustrated — and that's completely normal.

But here's something that can really help: co-regulation.

At Valley Art Therapy, we talk a lot about co-regulation — the process of helping another person (like your child) feel safe enough to calm down through your own calm, caring presence. It's how we help their nervous system shift from "I'm not okay" to "I feel safe again."

Why it matters

Thanks to Polyvagal Theory, we understand that our nervous systems are always scanning for cues of safety — and when they find them, that's when connection and regulation become possible. When a child is in fight, flight, or freeze, they can't think clearly, follow directions, or "just calm down." They need support — and often, they need you.

The good news? You don't have to be perfect. Even small, consistent moments of co-regulation

make a difference. Over time, this builds the foundation for self-regulation — the ability to manage big feelings on their own.

A few ways to start Start with yourself

Take a slow breath before you respond. Kids pick up on our energy more than our words — so your calm helps their body feel safe.

Validate what they're feeling

Try something simple like, "That was really hard," or "You're feeling so big right now, hey?" When kids feel understood, their system begins to settle.

Stay close, without pressure

You don't have to fix it. Just being there — with a soft voice, a calm presence, maybe a hand on their back — can be enough.

Use rhythm and routine

Repetitive, predictable activities can help kids feel safe and settled. Anything from rocking, humming, walking, reading or playing together, or even predictable bedtime routines help kids feel safe and settled.

Know it's okay to be human

You may lose your cool sometimes. We all do.

Repair is part of regulation too — a simple "I got overwhelmed, I'm sorry" teaches so much. When you're overwhelmed, taking a moment to pause and breathe helps you show up the way you want to.

The truth is, co-regulation isn't a fancy technique
— it's the everyday ways
we help our kids feel safe

in the world. And when they feel safe with us, they learn how to feel safe in themselves.

If this feels hard, or if you're not sure where to start, you're not alone.


