Notice of Construction Update for Birtle Water and Sewer Renewals (MWSB #1750)

Starting June 2025, Castle Construction Ltd. will be mobilizing in Birtle to complete the sidewalk and boulevard restoration works associated with the watermain and sewer renewals works completed last Fall.

Construction restoration works will include sidewalk and boulevard restorations along Main Street right-ofway from Centre Street to 11th Street in Birtle. Castle Construction will be contacting individual property owners to coordinate the restorations accordingly.

Stantec Consulting and Castle Construction representatives will be in Birtle in the upcoming weeks to perform preliminary restoration works, such as restoration layout, planning, etc. During construction, paint marks will be present in Birtle and will mostly be located in the public right-of-way. Please do not remove any paint marks.

For your safety and to provide adequate working space for the contractor, parking on the road and building access will be limited as construction restorations progress along Main Street for a period of time. Garbage collection will be maintained for the duration of the project. To keep your children and pets safe, please keep them away from the construction site at all times.

In accordance with By-Law 2016-05 of Prairie View Municipality to regulate burning within the Municipality.


As of May 8, 2025, there will be a burn ban in effect. All outdoor fires are banned with the exclusion of barbeques and designated campfire pits in the municipality.





Community Voices Surveys - Your Voice, Our Future

Early Survey Insights from Prairie View Residents!

Making informed decisions on how to best serve you is important to BMDDC! That's why the Birtle Miniota District Development Corporation launched a series of community surveys focusing on housing, employment, services and recreation — topics that shape everyday life and long-term growth in Prairie View.

While the surveys are still ongoing, early responses have already provided meaningful insight into what matters most to residents. Here's what we've learned so far!

Housing & Employment: Most respondents are current homeowners, though several are looking for alternative housing options such as in-town condos or smaller, se-

nior-friendly units. While many are retired or already employed locally, there's interest in more job opportunities within Prairie View. Some local employers, particularly in healthcare, shared ongoing challenges with staffing. This points to a dual opportunity: expand housing diversity to meet changing needs, and support workforce development, especially in sectors like healthcare.

Travel Patterns: Many residents frequently travel outside Prairie View for essential services and recreation. Common reasons include shopping, healthcare appointments, children's activities, social outings and employment. Popular destinations include Brandon, Russell, Virden and Shoal Lake. However, a strong message came through: people want to stay local when possible. More community events, expanded retail options and additional healthcare services locally could significantly reduce the need for out-oftown travel and strengthen local engagement.

Recreation: There's clear enthusiasm for additional recreation options. Residents showed interest in: Arts, music and cultural events, Youth and senior programs, Outdoor and fitness-based activities.

Suggestions included concerts, trail systems for quadding and hiking, snowshoeing, social gatherings and drop-in sports for teens.

Key Opportunities Identified So Far:

Housing: Increase availability of smaller, rental-style and senior-friendly units.

Employment: Promote and support local job opportunities.

Local Services: Expand ing retail and medical options would reduce the need for travel.

Recreation: Opportunities include additional social gatherings, expansion and promotion of trails as well as increasing drop-in activities for teens.

There's still time to share your voice! These surveys are being released in stages to take a deeper look into specific community needs. Your input can help to directly shape future planning and development.

Be careful with farm machinery around overhead power lines _____

Three incidents in past week underscore need for awareness around electrical infrastructure.

WINNIPEG - Manitoba Hydro is reminding agricultural producers in Manitoba to exercise caution around overhead power lines, utility poles and transmission towers.

There have been several incidents already this spring where farm machinery contacting hydro equipment has resulted in significant damage. In the last week alone, three incidents have occurred, one of which resulted in the loss of a tower on Manitoba Hydro's Bipole 1 High Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) transmission line in the Interlake.

Other incidents involving distribution poles have occurred in both the Russell area and near Oakville, Manitoba, causing local

power outages.

Fortunately, there were no injuries in any of the incidents, and the damaged HVDC tower has since been replaced and the line will be back in service later today.

While there were no impacts to electrical service due to the HVDC contact, damage to overhead power lines, poles and towers can result in outages affecting service to hospitals, police and fire stations that can impact public safety, as well as other customers. Contact with overhead powerlines also presents a significant electrocution risk to agricultural producers.

Because today's farm equipment is bigger than ever, it can more easily come into contact and damage electrical infrastructure. It is critical that producers:

• Know the height and




width of their equipment.

- If it's over 4.8 metres in height, apply online for a clearance permit from Manitoba Hydro before moving equipment to different fields on public roadways.
- When driving equipment under a power line, ensure a distance of at least 3 metres (or 10 feet) from overhead power lines.

• Prevent a tragedy by identifying hazards before equipment is moved or operated, staying alert, and discussing power line safety with everyone working on the farm.






