"We had not even been in the community 4 months before word got out, stirring thoughts about a team, when we were approached by a couple families to see if we would be interested in starting a club right here in Birtle." recalls Teneil Fogg.

Travis and Teneil's previous experience running a club volleyball team back in Saskatchewan was seen as an oppotunity by parents for a local club of their own.

The first meeting took place in the Fogg family's kitchen. Eighteen parents gathered around sharing in their vision and enthusiasm. With strong support from the community, the club officially registered and when tryouts were announced more than 28 athletes signed up. However, a snowstorm made travel difficult and only 20 players could attend. Of those that tried out, coaches Tricia Lelond and Travis Fogg chose ten talented athletes to create their team and the Valley Viperz were born.

Players Kinley Cottingham, Keera Galloway, Quinn Bryant, Leah van den Heuval, Reese Lelond, Tiffany Brown, Kole Ward Fogg, Rylee Maynes, Kali Howe and Andi Chartier were the first to don the Valley Viperz jersey, representing the club with pride and setting the bar for future teams to follow.

Since its inception, the team has received great support, securing funding that helped them acquire much-needed equipment. However, as they continue to grow they are still seeking additional funding to purchase another key piece of training equipment.

This weekend marks a major milestone for the



On Monday Feb. 24th, Valley Services for Seniors sponsored an afternoon of entertainment featuring



### Neck Tension and the Vagus Nerve -The Hidden Connection

Gratitude journaling is all about recording the things you're thankful for. 




