
Sprouting Joy with Valley Rec

This Earth Day, students in Miniota and Birtle are getting their hands a little dirty — for a great cause!

Thanks to a special initiative by Valley Recreation, all 79 students at Miniota School (K–8) and 99 students at Birtle Elementary School (K–4) will be receiving Earth Day kits to help them learn about nature, sustainability and the power of a tiny seed.

Cont'd from Front To spark curiosity and encourage kids to connect with the earth right from their classroom or kitchen windowsill.

Recreation Director Martyn Lambe has been busy putting things together in preparation. "Because it's a kit, there is very little work for parents. They'll have everything they need and the directions will help the kids learn to grow their flowers." says Martyn. All supllies are provided by Valley Recreation.

Sunflower seeds should germinate in just 7 to 10 days if placed in a sunny spot indoors. Once the weather warms up, students can transfer their growing plants outdoors, giving their sunflowers plenty of room to stretch toward the sun.

But the fun doesn't stop there! Students are invited to submit a photo of their blossoming sunflowers with a measuring stick for scale. There will be two winners per school: one for the tallest sunflower and another for the sunflower with the largest or most lush foliage. Each winner will receive a



dace Bergeson), Ron (Val) and her brother -in-law Terry Howard and their families. Besides her parents, Donna was predeceased by her sister Anna Howard.


Several residents attended the Brandon Royal Winter Fair during spring break.


Our Miniota community extends deepest sympathy to Travis and Chloe Sheane on the death of Chloes grandpa Gordon Quinn.

Feeding your Feelings

If you've ever been "hangry" you know that lack of nutrition can play a role on your mood! The truth is, your brain is just as hungry as your body. Emotions like anger, anxiety, sadness or even social withdrawal can be signs that your brain isn't getting the nutrients it needs to function optimally. Just as your muscles need protein to grow, your mood depends on your body having access to key vitamins, minerals and healthy fats.

Why Nutrients Matter for Emotional Processing

As mentioned, just like your body needs protein to build muscle, it needs specific nutrients to process emotions. Emotions like sadness, fear, anger or anxiety aren't just feelings, they're chemical signals in the brain. Processing these emotions requires neurotransmitters like serotonin, dopamine and GABA, all of which depend on vitamins, minerals, and fatty acids to be made and function properly. Without the right building blocks, your brain can't regulate or release these emotions effectively. This can leave you feeling stuck, overwhelmed or numb. Your body may want to move through a tough emotion but, without the right nutrition, it literally can't.

Food is more than fuel... it's information for your brain. Emotions don't just "happen", they are the result of chemical messages that depend on having the right nutrients available.

Emotional Eating: A Misguided Attempt at Nourishment

Emotional eating is often seen as a lack of will-power or simply a coping mechanism, but it may also be your body intuitively trying to meet a real need, just in the wrong way.

When we're feeling anxious, sad, overwhelmed or lonely, our bodies may actually be sending out signals for nutrients that support mood regulation (things like magnesium, B vitamins or healthy fats). But instead of reaching for foods that meet those



biological needs we often crave the "quick fix" that's a high-sugar, high-fat comfort food. Why? Because these foods give a quick dopamine hit. They feel emotionally rewarding in the moment even though they don't actually address the root imbalance.

It's kind of like your brain is saying, "We need serotonin support!" and instead of feeding it the eggs or nuts it needs, we throw it a donut and hope for the best. That's why the emotional relief is so shortlived and why the cravings keep coming back.

When we begin to nourish ourselves with more intention, feeding not just our cravings but our brain's and body's actual requirements, the urge to eat emotionally often subsides...

...OK so this week's "highlight" became a bit more indepth than anticipated. Those who know me well, know I have lots more to say but I will end it with this quote from my son.

"I'm eating this for my body, not my tastebuds." - Ander Age 5

Because food isn't just about how it tastes - it's fuel for our minds and bodies. It's one of the most powerful tools we have for emotional resilience. A well-fed brain is a calmer, more adaptable brain and sometimes the smallest nutritional shifts can create the biggest emotional changes.


